At Matrix Global Schools we pride ourselves in sending students out of the classroom. We understand the value of experiences and giving students the opportunity to move out of their comfort zone into the unknown. This mission was not only accomplished during our recent school field trips within Negeri Sembilan, but also on an international scale when 20 students and 3 teachers attended the 7th International Culture, Education & Arts Festival at Hengshui City from 10 to 20 June 2019.

The venue for the festival was Hengshui High School, a semi-military school that requires its more than 10,000 students to obey a strict set of rules and regulations. They study for close to 15 hours a day, often seven days a week, and have half the time for lunch than what students enjoy at MGS. This work ethic clearly bears fruit, considering that Hengshui High School boasts the highest number of students being offered placements at high ranking universities in mainland China, as well as universities in the United Kingdom, for example Oxford University. Letting our students see this way of schooling allowed them to reflect on their own studies, draw a comparison, and reimagine their own academic goals. We want our students to pursue excellence, but instead of just dreaming, show them what it takes to achieve it.

We are very proud that MGS students won the forum on 'Why your country should host the Cultural Exchange in 2020?'. We would be even more happy to know that they are enriched by their experience in China and filled with the same motivation to excel that they've witnessed in Hengshui High School.

SPM Preparation: Bahasa Melayu Seminar

On 25 July, a 4-hour seminar to train students on the answering techniques for SPM Bahasa Melayu Paper 1 and Paper 2 was conducted for all Form 5 students.

The school invited En.Nasir bin Ibrahim, who is a Chief Examiner for SPM Bahasa Melayu subject, to give talks to the SPM candidates. Among En.Nasir's major contribution to the academic teaching of Bahasa Melayu subject was to introduce the 'IMBaKUP technique' which has been proven to assist students' thinking strategy when doing composition tasks.

It was reassuring to see the students actively participating in the seminar with their probing questions to the speaker and by taking part in the quizzes given. The school is working towards bringing more such seminars to benefit students especially in preparing them for major examinations.

During the festival, our students performed the 'Dikir Barat' entitled 'Wau Bulan' to a full auditorium. They were able to captivate the hearts of many during the performance and planted the tune of the performance in the minds of others throughout the trip.

The MGS team also participated in an impromptu forum against the other countries and managed to win the best presentation award led by two speakers, Harin Ravandran (Form 4) and Shazana Alina Sorfina (Form 2). The students were hailed for their passionate speech to convince the judges why the forum should be organised in Malaysia instead of in China.

In addition to the festival, the students had the opportunity to visit a number of historical places such as the Great Wall of China, Forbidden City, a Confucius Academy and the Hebei Museum for various cultural experiences.

They were also able to experience the learning culture in China by visiting different schools in Hengshui. Ee He Xun (Year 8) had this to say about the visit to Hengshui High School: "It was fascinating... Their teaching style was unique and it was a totally different experience from learning in Malaysia. We also had a glance at their sports complex: It was crowded with talented and hardworking students who put all their effort into obtaining fame and glory for their school and country. They even achieved entry into the Olympics and fully utilised their time in order to apply their skills and effort to obtain the gold medal in the Olympics."

The students made many new friends from the 9 other participating countries. It was an eye-opening experience for everyone filled with bonding and sharing of stories.


