## FROM THE MGS MANAGEMENT TEAM

In preparing our students to be able to communicate effectively as a global citizen, we are continuously raising the language proficiency level, particularly in MPS, by incorporating the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR) into language learning for English, Bahasa Malaysia and Mandarin.

Language learners have traditionally been described rather vaguely as beginners, intermediate learners or advanced learners. They are given grades or numerical scores in reports or transcripts, but these grades and numbers do not say much about what a learner is able to do in the target language.


CEFR, however, identifies three broad levels of language proficiency in terms of listening, speaking, reading and writing: Basic (A1 and A2), Independent (B1 and B2), and Proficient (C1 and C2), but it goes further and provides "can do" statements at each level to describe a learner's ability in some detail and in a positive manner. In this way, we are given a clearer idea of what the levels actually mean. Thus, many international high-stakes tests such as IELTS, TOEFL and TOEIC are aligned to CEFR.

Training will be provided for our teachers to prepare them to implement CEFR in the teaching of languages. For example, to enable the basic user to 'understand and use familiar everyday expressions', the teacher will speak slowly and clearly for the students to follow the expressions taught by the teacher. In addition, the teacher will pause at appropriate moments to enable the students to reflect and assimilate the new learning.

The MGS campus was constructed with sustainability in mind, and this includes our water management practices. The campus housed 3 units of Rainwater Harvesting Plant which integrates with the plumbing system in the school toilets. By using harvested rainwater for some of our water needs, we can reduce our dependence on water treated by the municipal council. That way, if the surrounding neighbourhood is affected by a water cut, the campus water supply can last at least a few days longer without any disruption.



Formative assessment strategies such as assessment for learning and assessment as learning, learner feedback, as well as differentiation strategies will be central in the training process. In addition, English enhancement and support programmes will also be carried out to coach and guide our students to reach a desired language proficiency level higher than the norm of the country.

#### Level A BASIC USER



Students in this level can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to themselves and able to interact and describe in simple terms, aspects of their background, immediate environment and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters.

#### Level B INDEPENDENT USER

Students in this level can interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party. They should be able to describe experiences and ambitions while briefly giving reasons and explanations for opinions and plans. They are also able to understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in their field of specialisation.

### Level C PROFICIENT USER

Students in this level are able to use language flexibly and effectively for social, academic and professional purposes. They can express ideas fluently and spontaneously and can produce clear, well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects.


